Valley Weeders Garden Club

The Valley Weeders Garden Club meets on the fourth Monday of every month at 7pm at the Enterprisers Hall, Middle Musquodoboit. The club occasionally has guest speakers, visits gardens outside the Musquodoboit Valley, and attends tours and regional meetings.

Members enjoy participating in projects which have been established by the club over the past several years, such as planting flowers at Braeside, the Bicentennial Theatre, and the Exhibition Grounds. Annually, the club erects and lights a Christmas tree in front of the Valley View Villa, hosts a plant sale, and arranges a local garden tour during the summer. Club members and volunteers set up and look after all the flower exhibits at the Halifax County Exhibition and sponsor the children's competition. As well, the Valley Weeders Garden Club provides a \$500 bursary for Musquodoboit Rural High School.

Heritage property needs help

The Harrison House, located on the Halifax County Exhibition Grounds, Middle Musquodoboit, was originally built in the 1800s and was the private residence of Dr. William Harrison.

Joe Howe, premier of Nova Scotia from 1860 to 1863, is remembered for delivering a speech to area residents from the widow's walk on the west end of Harrison House. In recent years, the building has fallen into disrepair and deemed unsafe for public use. At a public meeting held Feb 15, the Harrison House Preservation Society was formed to work with the Middle Musquodoboit Agricultural Society to offer suggested uses and means to generate funds to restore and maintain the building for the future.

The Harrison House is the second oldest building in the community and designated as a HRM Heritage Property.

Spring Fling

The Musquodoboit Valley Education Centre will be having its 3rd Annual Spring Fling on Friday May 25th, 2007 at the school, from 6:00pm - 8:30pm. A sheep or two and a kangaroo

For a little while, I will be writing a column from Australia to let at least one part of Canada know what it is like to live in the land of the gum trees.

I think at this point I had better tell you about Waterfall (please, don't get too jealous). Waterfall started way back in 1886 and was planned to be the end of the railway line from Sydney. There were a couple of routes proposed and due to some very generous land deals, the route we now have was

settled on. Waterfall has always been a railway town and about the early sixties we doubled the town with the 'new subdivision'. Funnily, after all these years, the old folks (that probably includes me) still call it the 'new subdivision'.

We had our first school in 1901, electricity in about 1936, water in the early 60s, and the sewer in the early 80s. About 5 kms from us and to the south is the Garrawarra Hospital, which is now a dementia specific hospital, but it started out as a TB hospital.

Our town is surrounded on the east side by the Royal National Park and the Heathcote State Park on the west side. It looks very serene most of the time, except when the bushfires start. Then, it can look like a horror painting.

Our town is now a terminus for Sydney trains and a quick stop for trains to the south coast going all the way to Bomaderry. Already, I can tell you're jealous! Such is life.
